### Tyler Arboretum Offers Maple Sugaring And Pancake Breakfast Feb. 3

Tyler Arboretum will offers a taste of life in the sugarbush with tours and demonstrations of maple syrup production, complemented by a hearty pancake breakfast 8a.m. to lp.m. Saturday (Feb. 3).

Sugarbush is the old-fashioned term for a grove of sugar maple trees used for maple syrup production. Many peo-ple who have read "Little House in the Big Woods" will remember the excitement of maple sugaring at the Ingalls family homestead in the late 1800s. As winter ended and the sap began to flow, settlers would collect the sap from sugar maple trees then boil it make syrup and sugar because cane sugar was an expensive luxury then.

At the same time that the Ingalls family was tapping trees in Wisconsin, the Painter family was probably tapping maple sugar trees that grew on their farm that would eventually become Tyler Arboretum.

Participants in Tyler's Maple Sugaring can experience what it was like for the Painters to make maple syrup and learn about a present-day agricultur-al commodity. Pennsylvania ranks fifth in the nation for maple syrup production. The sap that flowed out of the state's 449,000 taps yielded 66,000 gallons of pure maple syrup in 2006.

Five sugar maple trees clustered around Lachford Hall, the Painter family's historic home, form Tyler's sugarbush. Experts will lead maple-sugar-

The tours conclude at the historic Painter Barn where visitors learn how the sap is made into maple syrup.

Breakfast will be served throughout the morning. The menu will feature pancakes and sausage, an assortment of beverages, and of course, maple syrup.

Admission to the event is \$7 for adults, \$4 for ages 3-12.
